A) 19th Century Feminist Haven – Women of Ocean Grove

Lyndell O'Hara, PhD, historian

At a time when women had few civil and economic rights, Ocean Grove was rich with stories of impressive accomplishments. Discover portraits of female doctors, hotel owners, authors, temperance workers and evangelists who pursued their passions and talents.

B) Brigid: Pagan Goddess or Christian Saint?

The origin story of Brigid, rooted in Celtic Ireland, has survived through the ages as an enduring inspiration for strong women. Is she two women – one a goddess, one a saint or one persona with two identities? Who is Brigid? Pagan or Christian? Mythic or historic? Hear Brigid's remarkable story and decide for yourself.

E) Anne Bradstreet, America's First Poet

Arriving with the "Great Migration" of English Puritans after 1630, Anne Bradstreet defied the convention that poets were male, and became the second author from Massachusetts to be published in England where her work became a best seller. Her later poems focus on the everyday lives of Puritan women, fear

of childbirth, absent husbands, house fires, and the joys of grandchildren. Dr. Calendar will discuss her life and note how she subtly uses her poems to undermine male attitudes of her society.
